Playing on the Edge

July 5 through 7, EdgeFest '96 invades the edge of the county and is shaping up to be the biggest festival ever in Southern Ohio by Don Willis

This year will mark the 3rd anniversary of Scioto County's premier rock festival EdgeFest. With over six months of preparation and advertising across much of the United States, this year's festival is shaping up to be one of the biggest events to ever hit Scioto County. Unchained (a clothing company from San Diego, Ca.) will be filming the festival and plans to air a portion of it on an MTV ad. Festival organizer Chris Wright has been with the event since its start at Branch Rickey Park in 1994. "It started as a benefit for the (Branch Rickey) park and has drastically increased in popularity since then," says Chris. "Last year's turnout was much greater compared to the first year. The festival had to be moved out of Portsmouth, however, due to some local politics." It looks like the festival will stay out of the city limits in the future as well. The location this year will be in Minford, Ohio at the site of the old Teays Valley tractor pulls.

The entertainers this year are from all over the eastern third of the United States as well as a few local acts. Among some of the traveling bands in the festival are Chum, a Huntington W.Va. grunge style band that has recently signed with a major label; NU Deep, hip-hop metal rockers from Wilmington, NC; The Lincolns, another Raleigh band that brings their punk-pop style to Appalachia; Regatta 69, a Chapel Hill, NC band playing Ska (rock-reggae) music at its best; and Dayroom, groovy alternative rock from out of Athens, Ga.

A little closer to home, Ishkabibble will bring their chicken-bakin' and shakin' funk from Columbus down to entertain us. Dayton's Laszlo (a returnperformer) will play their progressive mind-bending music to kick-off the event at 4:00 p.m. on Frkday, and Lem Darro, a progressive power rock trio from Columbus will start things up Sunday at 1:00 p.m. The newcomer spot at 2:00 p.m. Saturday will go to local hook metal rockers The Big Scary from South Webster, Ohio.

The local acts this year include Spagetty (a band featuring Chris Wright on drums); Pour The Coal, Scioto County's bad boys of metal; Notion sack, blues-jazz fusion (including former members of bump); and The Boogie Men, an old school power blues trio. There is also a scheduled performance by 11:00 Daddy, (including former Plaid Bone members) and Kenny Wayne, a tribute to Hank Williams Sr. from Nashville, Tennessee.

Besides the live music, vendors will set up to sell food, clothes, curlos, and do-dads, there will be merchandise available by most of the bands (including CD's, T-shirts, etc.), and plenty of room for campers. Chris is encouraging everyone to bring a tent and camp out if anyone plans on drinking. There will be drunk driving literature placed around the festival area to discourage drinking and driving. This year's proceeds will be going to benefit the Salvation Army food pantry of Portsmouth. EdgeFest may not be the panacea for Scloto County's economic woes, but its definitely a step in the right direction.

In Lytten's ruling he stated that the Plaintiffs did not respond to a motion filed by the attorneys for the Portsmouth City Schools, in which the Portsmouth City Schools demanded that Judge Lytten throw out the case. For that reason, the judge granted the Portsmouth City Schools Boards request and dismissed the case, two days prior to a formal hearing. The dismissal occurred without any hearing held in open court for the Plaintiff to state his case

on behalf of the public. May 9, 1996, 2:30 pm., was the date and time for the scheduled hearing. Sentinel reporter Austin Leedom was at the courthouse to attend the hearing and was informed that the case had been dismissed.

Mr. Leedom asked the court secretary to check her computer to see if the Plaintiff's had filed the proper responses. Ms. Hancock checked the computer and found that the Plaintiff's had indeed filed a motion in response as required by law.

On May 10, 1996, Austin Leedom met with Judge Walter Lytten, to discuss this with the judge. When asked why he dismissed the case when a contra motion had been timely filed by the plaintiffs the judge said, " I can't comment on a pending case." Leedom pressed Judge Lytten with the fact that the case was not pending, but finalized on May 7, 1996 with his dismissal of the case, at which time Judge Lytten stated, "the case

could be appealed." The Sentinel has been investigating this case since the discovery of the "secret" agreement in settlement November 1995. In March of 1996 Sentinel Reporter Wally . the attended Leedom Portsmouth City School Boards public meeting at McKinley Middle School, at which time he publicly requested, in a prepared document, answers to questions that were asked for under the court requested writ of mandamus.

Board member Rusty Miller ordered Portsmouth City School District Superintendent Garry Osborn to deliver the questions to the Portsmouth City Solicitor's Office for review and answers. As of this date, no answers have been provided to the Sentinel by the Portsmouth City School District or the Portsmouth City Solicitor's Office.

Male and female students living SSU student housing in complained to Jacqueline Maillet, resident manager of university housing, concerning university employee Eric DeYoung, during spring quarter 1996. DeYoung was and is university housing resident assistant, a paid employee of SSU.

When questioned by SENTINEL reporters on April 4th, 1996, concerning the complaints against DeYoung, Maillet's only response was "I know what you're talking about and I think it's funny."

The complaints that students had voiced to the SENTINEL include unauthorized entry into female students apartments, at times while the students were bathing. Also unauthorized entry into male students apartments, at least once while brandishing a handgun.

As RA, DeYoung has a key to every students apartment at bousing, several female students expressed concern and fear over the pass key situation.

Female students also complained of the forceful treatment of another female student, by DeYoung, at an off campus party.

SSU STUDENT HANDBOOK 1995-96 states on page 34, "as a condition of admission and continued enrollment, students who are not living within a 50-mile radius of the university with their immediate families, are required to live in university housing, etc."

Maillet's response to the DeYoung complaints sparked a complaint to her supervisors and the university began an investigation of the complaints the following day.

A review of the John Welton trial transcript and other documents indicate that Ohio State Auditor Doug Smith may have committed perjury and assisted in withholding evidence favorable to former SSU Bursar John Welton during Welton's criminal trial in early 1994.

The Sentinel has reviewed a transcript of Smith's testimony and compared it with newly discovered documents and found major discrepancies with what Mr. Smith testified to and what really transpired prior to and during the trial of Welton.

These documents also reveal that Scioto County Prosecutor Lynn Grimshaw may have been involved in the withholding of key documents that may have proven Welton's innocence.

During the trial, Mr. Smith testified that he was chosen to do the audit from a list of assistant auditors, and that he was chosen because he had no ties to Shawnee State University. On page 388 of the trial transcript Mr. Grimshaw asks Mr. Smith, "Are you saying that the auditor's office was wanting to find auditors that had nothing at all to do with Shawnee State University?".

Mr. Smith answered "Yes". Mr. Grimshaw then went on to ask, "As a matter of fact, was there someone else that was assigned to help you for a short period of time that was taken off the audit, and why was that?"

Mr. Smith stated, "Yes there was, it was discovered that they had attended Shawnee State University for one or two classes about ten years ago."

Later in the trial, Mr. Russ Kegley, attorney for Mr. Welton, asked Mr. Smith about prior jobs he had before going to work for the auditor's office. Smith stated that one of his jobs was with a firm called, "Reynolds and Company in Portsmouth".

The Sentinel has uncovered that this firm is owned and operated by Mr. Tom Reynolds, who was at the time of the trial, a member of the Shawnee State University Board of Trustees, and is now president of the board.

The Sentinel has learned that prior to starting the audit, Mr. Smith withheld this fact from the Ohio State Auditor's Office. Smith was required by Audit Bulletin 89-002, Independence of Assigned Staff, to reveal and "acknowledge that they do not have direct or material indirect professional, personal or business relationships with anyone at the aformentioned auditee."

This information was uncovered in a document titled "Engagement Planning Document," in the possession of the auditors of the state of Ohio.

Mr. Smith withheld the fact that he had been formerly employed by an individual who had involvement in this case.

At the time of the trial, Mr. Smith appeared to deliberately mislead the jury and Mr. Welton's attorney, by claiming that at the time of the trial, only one year of the audit was completed. On pages 389-390 of the transcript Mr. Smith was asked, "Do you recall the initial period you were looking at Shawnee State? I mean, did you go back to 1980 to present?" Mr. Smith answered, "We began with the end of

September and went back to August of 91 or 92."

The Sentinel has uncovered a letter written to Continental Guaranty & Credit Corporation. dated February 14, 1994, which is two weeks prior to the start of Mr. Welton's trial which states in part, "We have prepared spreadsheets analyzing the cash and check variances for the period from August 31, 1993 back to August 31, 1990". This letter goes on to state. "This information is being used the Scioto County Prosecutor in the prosecution of his case against defendant, Mr. John Welton."

Throughout Mr. Doug Smith's testimony, Attorney Grimshaw, and Mr. Smith infer to the jury that during the period of September 1993 back to August of 1992, only 29 days: had discrepancies of cash and check with any "substantial amounts". But the Sentinel has now uncovered documents to prove that the 29 days used in the case against Mr. Welton may have been manipulated in a manner to show that only Mr. Welton was the one who could have stolen any missing money.

On page 7 of the Ohio State Auditor's Engagement Planning Document, number 1e states as follows: "We do not believe that Ms. Vickle Grigson, the only other full time employee in the Bursar Office, was involved in U. the activities engaged in by Mr. Welton. The university is preparing a listing of the days worked and time taken off for both John Welton and Vicki Grigson to show that on the days off for Ms. Vicki Grigson, monies were taken by John Welton."

This statement draws into question the testimony of Ms. Elinda Boyles, Shawnee State University Personnel Director. Ms. Boyles stated that it was she that was given a list of days to check out by Mr. Doug Smith, but the engagment planning document states the opposite.

The Sentinel reviewed Mr. Welton's personnel file and discovered that there are. 100-150 dates on the public audit report in which substantial funds were noted as being

missing and Welton was not at work and which is proven by sick leave, vacation and personal leave forms signed by his supervisors. None of these dates were disclosed to the jury by Mr. Smith, Ms. Boyles or Mr. Grimshaw during the first trial. However, based on the audit report, many of these dates were known to Prosecuting Attorney Grimshaw prior to the start of Mr. Welton's trial. Mr. Smith's testimony is very

troubling in that Smith stated he didn't do a "full accounting of the university books". Smith also stated that he was not aware of where the documents he reviewed in his audit were kept prior to his receiving the documents to perform his audit. Upon Mr. Smith's arrival at SSU, he was taken to a "locked filing cabinet" and given records that he was told to audit. Smith testified that these were the only records he audited and that he could not verify their authenticity.

The Sentinel has now uncovered proof that these documents were kept in the possession of Shawnee State University Officials even though the documents were allegedly seized under a court ordered

search warrant, a clear violation of the Ohio Revised Code. In the engagement planning document, page 9, #7, reads as follows: "Initial meeting was to brief us on the theft and arrest of Mr. John Welton and to review the documents seized from Mr. Welton's office by the Ohio Highway Patrol." This meeting was attended by Dr. David Creamer, vice president, administration, Mr. Joseph Smith, field audit supervisor, and Mr. Clare Rubadue, district audit manager.

During that meeting as stated on page 8 of the engagement planning document, the auditors asked Dr. Creamer a very critical question. "Should the use of specialists be used?" Dr. Creamer's response Why wouldn't was "NO". Shawnee State University: want specialists to do this audit? Mr. Welton's attorney attempted to bring before the jury that Mr. Doug Smith was not an expert, but Judge Walter Lytten overruled him and let Attorney

Lynn Grimshaw portray Doug Smith as an expert, when

Grimshaw had knowledge that Mr. Doug Smith was chosen not for his expertise, but chosen for the lack of his knowledge and ability.

The Sentinel disclosed in


an earlier edition the discovery of a nine column spreadsheet that gave figures for the total receipts the Bursar's Office took in, the total cash/checks taken in by the Bursar's Office and the variances with each, and finally a column titled, total variance for the entire audit period which amounted to less that \$850.00.

Mr. Welton's attorney asked Mr. Smith, "So, during the period of your audit, do you have knowledge of how much money Shawnee State was supposed to be taking in and how much they actually deposited." Mr. Smith answered "Yes". Defense Attorney Russ Kegley then asked, "And what are those figures?"

Mr. Smith answered, "During the whole period of our audit?". Mr. Kegley responded, "Yes". Mr. Smith then stated, "I don't have them with me."


It appears now that had the nine column audit been provided by Mr. Smith, that his testimony could have been proven to be perjured testimony.
