DAN YOUNG ORDERS ROLL BACK OF ILLEGAL PAY INCREASE TO WORK-STONE COMPETITIVE BIDS FOR SECURITY ORDERED BY SSU VP OF BUSINESS AFFAIRS

Three days after the *Sentinel* revealed that SSU was paying Work-Stone Security Inc. of New Boston large amounts of money with no contract Mr. Dan Young, Shawnee State University Assistant Director of Facilities, sent Mr. Gary L. Stone of Work-Stone Security a

letter. In this letter Mr. Young rejected Mr. Stone's request for pay without a contract. Mr. Young wrote that the request that Mr. Stone had made for an increase from SSU was not justified by the raise in the federal minimum wage.

Mr. Young noted that Mr. Stone had been given a 9.3% increase in 1993, a 9% increase in 1994, and a 4% increase in 1995 all "to give our employees a cost of living increase."

Mr. Young wrote, "If, in fact, you have passed on those increases to your employees, you should not have been affected

by the \$.50 increase in the minimum wage, the first in five years, from \$4.25 to \$4.75. It is our intention to recover the overcharge which is the difference between the \$8.35 hourly rate and the \$7.83 hourly rate."

A photo-copy of the letter sent to Work/Stone Security from Mr. Young is shown below.

The *Sentinel* exposed in the Oct. 28, 1996 issue that for several years Work-Stone Security, Inc. had received pay from SSU without proper competitive bidding procedures being followed. A letter dated Oct. 16 1996 from Work-Stone to SSU admitted that Mr. Stone had not passed the increased pay on to his employees as he had intimated to SSU that he would.

Re: Contract Status

Dear Mr. Stone:

Please be advised that the current terms of your services are understood to be a temporary extension of the existing contract terms and should be billed at the contract price of \$7.83/hour. Your request for an increase is not justified by the raise in the federal minimum wage and is therefore denied. As you recall, you requested a 9.3% increase in 1993; a 9% increase in 1994; and a 4% increase in 1995 all "to give our employees a cost of living increase". If, in fact, you have passed on those increases to your employees, you should not have been affected by the \$.50 increase in the minimum wage, the first in five years, from \$4.25 to \$4.75. It is our intention to recover the overcharge which is the difference between the \$8.35 hourly rate and the \$7.83 hourly rate. This adjustment will be made on the next payment.

I have been advised that this security contract must be awarded under our competitive bidding procedures. Your request to enter into another extension of the initial 1992 contract cannot be approved. We may request temporary security coverage for up to 90 days under the same terms of the 1992 contract at the \$7.83/hour rate until the contract is awarded. If you are not agreeable to this understanding, please advise in order that the University can make alternative arrangements for security coverage. If you have any questions with regard to this letter, please advise.

Local dignitaries Allard and Desantis encourage hometown spending; they shop out of town

Dan DeSantis, top dog of the Southern Ohio Growth Partnership, popularly known as the Same Old Gang Program, (SOGP) was editorialized and featured in a news item in the December 3d, 1996 Portsmouth Daily Times for successfully spending \$5000 with an out of town company.

GTE donated the \$5,000 to the SOGP in an effort to enable the SOGP to develop a web site for the promotion of the local area.

DeSantis promptly hired Marcy Designs of Columbus, Ohio to create the web site.

So what good is an SSU education to our local people if our local agencies won't hire them to put their education to good use? Many current and past SSU students are well able to develop web sites. Shame on you Dan DeSantis. You didn't even offer this job to our local people.

When interviewed by the Sentinel, by telephone, on Dec. 5th 1996, at 8:45 AM, Mr. DeSantis was reluctant, haughty, interruptive and attempted to dominate the conversation.

When the Sentinel asked Mr. DeSantis how much he gets paid as SOGP President, Mr. DeSantis became secretive and threatening. Mr. DeSantis refused to tell his salary. He also said, "If you print that, I am going to sue you."

The GPEC gave over \$700,000 (seven hundred thousand dollars) of federal money to the SOGP in 1996. Mr. DeSantis said that the SOGP is a private sector organization.

Mr. DeSantis further encouraged the Sentinel reporter to go to the Daily Times to get his information. The reporter advised Mr. DeSantis that the Daily Times is a poor source of news.

Mr. DeSantis, we say to you, when you do bring legal action we encourage you to please employ a local attorney, do not spend the money out of town.

Portsmouth Daily Times Managing Editor Debbie Allard also shops for big ticket items out of town. Ms. Allard titled on Oct. 28 1996, at the Scioto County Court House, a recently purchased, \$21,800 used luxury car. She bought her car in Flatwoods, Ky.

An editorial in the Daily Times, dated Dec. 1, 1996, reads in part, "area residents are giving the Portsmouth and Scioto County business communities the patronage they deserve." The editorial goes on to say "give your hometown merchants the first look for your shopping needs. We appreciate your business."

Okay, who is this we that the editorial says appreciates your business? It is certainly not the Portsmouth Daily Times. They are not a hometown business.

In fact, they take over \$400,000. (four hundred thousand dollars) a year out of here, every year, and send it to their home office. This is money that does not come back to our area.

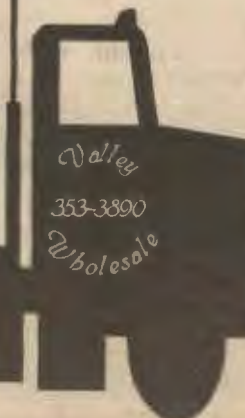

Letter to the Editor

Hear Ye! Hear Ye! Hear Ye!
Judge Walter Lytten's Court of
"What's Happenin Now" is
now in session.

To those of you who read my
letter of a few weeks ago,
welcome back. To those of
you who didn't, find a copy
and catch up. It's going to get
better for some. However it
will get worse and worse for
some well deserving others.

In my first letter I exposed
Judge Walter Lytten for
threatening to have me fired
from my job because I was
pursuing charges against his
Chief Probation Officer and
Bailiff, Mark Darby.

Well, Judge Lytten has
expanded his abuse of power
to include all the citizens of
Scioto County.

I'm sure a lot of you read in
the *Daily Times* that Mr. Darby
was charged with assault and
theft against Wallace Leedom
and a lady.

These offenses occurred
while Mr. Leedom was deliver-
ing the *Shawnee Sentinel*,
(free of charge) to the citizens
in the Scioto County Court
House. Mr. Leedom and the
lady were manhandled and the
Shawnee Sentinel newspapers
were taken from Mr. Leedom
by force by Mr. Darby. That
act alone is a violation of the
First Amendment to the
Constitution of the United
States, "Freedom of the
Press."

I'm sure many of you
wonder, "Why would Mr.
Darby do such a stupid
thing?" One answer could be
that the newspaper was
exposing his father-in-law,
Chief Gary Stone of the New
Boston Police Department.

According to Mr. Leedom's
account, the abuse and
intimidation didn't stop there.

Mr. Darby ordered them out
of the court house or he would
arrest them for "soliciting."
This is very interesting since
Mr. Leedom was giving the
papers for free and Mr. Darby
has no power to arrest for
soliciting.

However, Mr. Darby followed
Mr. Leedom to the back alley
and demanded to know the
location of Mr. Leedom's car
so he could confiscate
whatever other papers he had.

The theft of the newspapers
took place in front of the
County Prosecutors office
with several witnesses
present, two of them assistant
county prosecutors.

There seems to be a definite
pattern of behavior here. The
incident where Mr. Darby
repeatedly shouted foul
names at me occurred on the
second floor of the Scioto
County Court House in front
of Judge Lytten's office and
courtroom.

Oh well, I guess Mr. Darby is
quite safe doing this where he
works and while carrying a
badge and gun.

Now, on to what Judge
Lytten did to the citizens of
Scioto County.

A lot of us read in the *Daily
Times* a few days before the
election that after Mr. Darby
was charged and booked for
assault and theft he resigned.
I think it read, "he felt it was
in every one's best interest
that he resign."

Well, he did get that part
right.

So, what were we all led to
believe? I for one, was led to
believe that Mr. Darby was no
longer an employee of the
Scioto County Common Pleas
Court. After all, the article
stated he resigned, that
means you are no longer
connected to the employer

you said you resigned from.

I believe the article appeared
on Thursday, before the
election. By that Friday
rumors were circulating that
Mr. Darby was coming back
after the election -- and that
this was all a manipulation by
Judge Walter Lytten. Having
heard this rumor, I went to the
Auditor's Office on the
Monday before the election. I
asked David Green, Scioto
County Auditor, if Mr. Darby
had been officially discharged
from employment with the
Scioto County Common Pleas
Court. I learned he had not
been discharged and was in
fact on the payroll with two
days vacation. Now, Mr.
Darby resigned on
Wednesday, it was made
public on Thursday, but he
was paid for two days after he
resigned as though he hadn't
resigned at all.

Well, that question was
answered after the election
when Mr. Darby showed up for
work with his badge and gun
on.

We then got to read about it
in the *Daily Times*. I believe
Judge Lytten stated, "He was
too busy with "other" things
at the time Mr. Darby
submitted his resignation and
he didn't have time to act on
it; when he did have time
"after" the election he chose
not to accept the resignation!"

We now know what he was
busy with, he was busy
manipulating the voters of
Scioto County and he used
the *Daily Times* to do it.

Let's see now ---
manipulating and deceiving
the voters -- I wonder if he
does that from his judicial
bench? Sounds almost
criminal doesn't it? It
certainly reeks of judicial
misconduct.

Now, maybe, this deceiving
of the public wouldn't mean
so much had there been a
three or four thousand vote
spread between Judge Lytten
and his challenger, but there
was less than a thousand.

Less than a thousand, an
amount that could easily be
by deceiving the public into
believing that he, (Judge
Walter Lytten) had done the
right thing by accepting Mr.
Darby's resignation because
of the criminal charges
pending against him.

What most or nearly all of
what the public doesn't know
is that Mr. Darby's actions
against Wallace Leedom and
myself are not the only ones.
A few years ago while
employed as Chief Probation
Officer of Common Pleas
Court, Mr. Darby showed up at
the Scioto County Jail late one
night. The following is an
account of that night given to
me by the then Scioto County
Sheriff's Department Sergeant
Mike Crabtree.

The sergeant stated that Mr.
Darby appeared at the main
gate accompanied by an
attorney. The sergeant said
Mr. Darby appeared to be in
an extremely intoxicated state.
Mr. Darby was demanding the
release of a female inmate
named Ruggles. Ms. Ruggles
was the wife of one of Mr.
Darby's probationers. Mr.
Darby was informed by the
sergeant that Ms. Ruggles

could not be released at which
time Mr. Darby became
verbally abusive with the
sergeant and began to
threaten physical harm to the
sergeant.

His words were, "You come
out of there and I'll whip your
fat a_s." This threat was
repeated until the sergeant
informed the attorney with Mr.
Darby he had better get Darby
out of there before he was
arrested.

Mr. Darby heard this
statement and followed with,
"You son-of-a-b__h, my job
is to see that you lose your
job." At this point the
attorney physically placed Mr.
Darby on the elevator and they
left.

There were witnesses to this
incident also; two of being
Deputy Alan Lewis and Dis-
patcher Jennifer Greenwood.

Reports were made by the
duty sergeant and the
witnesses and copies were
given to Judge Everett Burton,
nothing was done about this
either.

Right after Mr. Darby's foul
mouth attack on me I
approached Sheriff Sutterfield
to obtain copies of these
reports, in order to show a
pattern of abusive conduct,
needed for my legal
proceedings. Sheriff
Sutterfield had his staff
search for the reports; but
none of the reports could be
found. Sheriff Sutterfield
informed me that someone
had to have taken them.

Again Mr. Darby's abuse of
power and position took place
within the Scioto County
Court House -- and once
again nothing was done.

It appears that Mr. Darby is
well protected within your
Scioto County Court House
and the protection comes
from Judge Walter Lytten,
Scioto Common Pleas Court.

I have had numerous
citizens ask me, "how can
these people get away with
this?" The answer is "they
can" but only if we the people
do not demand that they be
held accountable for their
actions. After all, the rest of
us are, and some are held
accountable by these same
people.

Judge Walter Lytten's and
Mr. Darby's abuses of their
power and positions have now
been clearly laid before you.

You, as citizens of Scioto
County, have a right and a
responsibility to demand that
these people be held
accountable for their abuses.

I want to leave you with this
question in mind, what do you
think would happen to us if we
committed these same acts
against Judge Walter Lytten
and Mr. Darby that they have
committed against us?

This country belongs to "We
The People", not Judge Walter
Lytten or Mr. Darby.

Watch for the next issue of
the *Sentinel*. In it you will
read about all the steps I took
and several of your city and
county officials I talked with
trying to get them to do
something about Mr. Darby
before he abused someone
else. They were warned and
they did nothing and Mr.
Darby did go on to abuse
other people worse than what
he did to me.

Refuse to print the news

The *Portsmouth Daily Times* Publisher BJ Riley has refused to continue to allow the *Shawnee Sentinel* newspaper to be printed on the *Times* presses.

On October, 28, 1996, Mr. Riley arrived at work to find the print shop, located in the *Times* building, in the process of preparing the *Shawnee Sentinel* for print.

The *Times* building is the home of the finest printing presses in the local area. They have a union print shop and are known for high quality work. Several newspapers other than the *Times* are run off of their presses.

Mr. Riley met with an employee of the *Sentinel* at that time and notified the employee that he did not have an appointment to print today, and it was doubtful that the *Sentinel* could be printed on that day.

Mr. Riley then went on to indicate that it was probable that the *Sentinel* would never be printed on his presses again.

When questioned as to who had pressured Mr. Riley into this decision to not print, Riley said that he had not received a single complaint, the decision was entirely his.

When questioned as to why he had decided this, Mr. Riley indicated that part of his decision was based on his conception that the *Sentinel* tears down the very people that have worked so hard to build this community up. He said that it was a "moral decision" that he alone had made.

Mr. Riley was then reminded by the *Sentinel* employee that the *Sentinel* focuses mainly on theft and corruption in public office by public employees and elected officials, and makes every attempt to stay out of peoples bedrooms, meaning their personal lives. Mr. Riley was further advised that the *Sentinel* is the only local publication that will stand up for local people that have been damaged or harmed by public employees and the actions of public institutions.

Mr. Riley was then told about Sam Dotson, a young security officer at SSU, who was attempting to prevent a vehicle from being vandalized and possibly stolen at SSU. Mr. Dotson was beaten and crippled by the would be vandals. SSU promptly had Mr. Dotson fired. Mr. Riley was told "your paper will not stand up for Mr. Dotson, if you do, you go against the university, and you will not do that. Who is going to stand up for people like Mr. Dotson?"

When questioned as to specifically which article had offended him, Mr. Riley could not identify a single story printed by the *Sentinel* in which he took offense to.

When advised that the *Sentinel* is good journalism, and the *Sentinel* employees have attended journalism classes, just as he had, Mr. Riley denied ever taking a journalism class.

Mr. Riley was asked if this refusal to print the *Sentinel* was a form of censorship, he denied it.

He then agreed to print the *Sentinel* just this one last time.

The *Shawnee Sentinel* has been held to a higher standard by the *Daily Times* since it's inception. The official SSU newspaper, the *University Chronicle*, ran up a printing bill of over \$2,400 in early 1995, with the *Daily Times*. As late as fall quarter 1996, the SSU paper had again run up a printing bill of \$1,200. The *Sentinel* has never been given credit at the presses, and as required by the publisher, has always paid cash up front.

The editor of the *Sentinel* is a 21 year old black man who grew up farming tobacco in Southern Ohio. He is also a third year student at SSU. The publisher of the *Times* has been asked if his decision to not print the *Sentinel* is due in part to racism. Mr. Riley denied racism as a deciding factor.

In a telephone call to the *Times* on Friday December 13th, 1996, at 12:20 PM, the *Sentinel* asked if any black people worked there. The lady answering the phone said that to her knowledge, no black people work at the *Portsmouth Daily Times*.

The *Sentinel* is no longer printed by the excellent union printers at the *Portsmouth Daily Times*. ☒☒☒

SHAWNEE STATE PROFESSOR PLEADS NO CONTEST TO WEAPON CHARGE

SSU Psychology Professor Jerry L. Walke, Ph.D., entered a plea of no contest to a charge of carrying a concealed weapon in Municipal Court Aug. 20, 1996. Dr. Walke was fined \$100, and costs of \$75 and sentenced to 60 days in the county jail; his weapon was confiscated. The fine and costs were paid and the jail sentence suspended. Judge Howard Harcha placed Professor Walke on three years probation and ordered him to enroll in and complete the *Turning Points Program* at Scioto County Counseling Center. Professor Walke was arrested by sheriff's officers on July 26, 1996. He was represented by Attorney James Banks of Columbus and City Prosecutor Mark Kuhn represented the state.

Professor Walke has been off sick since Dec. 29, 1995, and has taught no classes this year. Dr. Walke has a \$5 million federal suit pending against Shawnee State University, and SSU administrators: Dr. David Todd, Dr. Ed Miner and Dr. Larry Mangus. The suit claims discrimination, and violations of civil rights. ♦ ♦ ♦ ♦

MIDNIGHT RAIDERS ENTER SSU OFFICES SEEKING SENTINELS

One section of SSU Security Incident Report No. 961865, written by Officer Leonard LeBrun reads as follows: "11-4-96 0300 On Oct. 29, 1996 at approximately between 11:45 p.m to 12:00 a.m. two males walked into the Security Office. Lt. Potts asked how they got into the building and one replied, "I got a key." Lt. Potts then asked the two people who they were and the same guy said, "I'm your boss, you just don't know it yet." At that time the same male started talking to me asking me when I started working here and ask about Ptl. Dotson. He then asked me about the *Sentinel* newspaper. I told him I had not seen any around and he told me that they were not supposed to be placed on campus and that they came in to see if any were placed on campus. Lt. Potts told them to talk to Mack from the *Chronicle*. They then walked down towards his office and a couple minutes later left the building at the South exit. Lt. Potts went to ask Mack who the two people were and Mack said they did not come to his office. At that time Mack, Lt. Potts and I ran outside and there was a car parked by CFA. It started up and drove off. We told Mack that they said they had a key and he said that Domino's Pizza had left a few minutes earlier and that the door may not been secured." Note: The SSU Security Office and the SSU University Chronicle Newspaper Offices are located in the basement of the old WIOI building on the Northwest corner of the campus. "Mack" is Mack W. Shelton Jr., Editor in Chief of the SSU University Chronicle newspaper. Continued on page 7

This letter is being written to request that Work-Stone Security be granted an extension on our present security contract through the next year without having to go through the bidding process. Our years providing service to Shawnee State University have been good ones and we would like to continue our services with you.

As per our conversation of February 27, 1995 with you and Mr. David Creamer, I requested a four percent (4%) increase effective July 1, 1995. A four percent increase would bring our present contract amount of \$65,958.00 up to \$68,596.32. This would provide us with the opportunity to give our employees a cost of living increase and at the same time, provide Shawnee State University with top security personnel.

In our discussion, it was suggested by Mr. Creamer that Work-Stone employees be permitted to attend classes at Shawnee State University at no added cost. This would be done with the approval of SSU President Clive Veri. If approved, class schedules would be scheduled through Dan Young and Gary Stone.

We have furnished you with a copy of our insurance. Work-Stone Security carries liability insurance with Northland Insurance Companies in the amount of one million dollars per occurrence. If you require further information please contact our agent, Mr. Bob Detrick of Bachus Insurance Agency, 9463 Montgomery Road, Cincinnati, Ohio 45242, at 513-791-4343. We are also responsible for carrying Workmans Compensation for each employee. Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code 4749.03(a)(1)(D) we have complied. You may contact Becky Watson of the Ohio Department of Commerce at 614-466-0426 for verification.

Your consideration in this matter and approval of employees attending classes at no charge is greatly appreciated.

In a letter to SSU, copied above, which was FAXED from Gary Stone of the Work-Stone Security, Inc. (WSSI) on 06-14-1995 from the NEW BOSTON VILLAGE POLICE DEPARTMENT, Chief Stone mentioned to Mr. Dan Young that he had discussed with Dr. Creamer that Work-Stone employees be given free college courses.

In a telephone call (907-474 7448) with Dr. David Creamer at 5:05 EST on Wednesday Dec. 11, 1996 at his office in Fairbanks, Alaska, the *Sentinel* was told that this program had been approved by Dr. Clive Veri, SSU president, and some of Gary Stone's employees had attended classes without charge. Dr. Creamer said that Chief Stone had much difficulty hiring and retaining guards and that he (Creamer) had made the offer to Chief Stone so that the job might be more attractive to employees and it would be easier for Chief Stone to fill the security guard positions at the university. In an interview on Dec. 6, 1996 Mr. Dan Young, Assistant Director of Facilities, told the *Sentinel* that Dr. Creamer had approved paying Work-Stone Security, Inc. without a contract for fiscal year 95-96. Dr. Creamer verified this and said he was aware that there was no contract.

Note: In November, 1995 Dr. David Creamer left SSU and departed for Alaska after the *Sentinel* published the true audit facts about the alleged loss of \$443,000 that Dr. Creamer had claimed for SSU from Continental Guaranty Insurance Company in the John Welton case. ♦

"John Welton must be silenced"....

"John Welton must be silenced," said brother Mike Welton, a local math teacher, when asked about the recent indictments for perjury against his brother. Mike continued, "John has repeatedly petitioned the courts to allow him to bring forth evidence that was withheld by the state at his trial and he has asked for prosecution of those who lied against him during that trial. The recent indictments against John Welton are a desperate effort by Prosecutor Lynn Grimshaw to cover false testimony, withholding of evidence and other improper acts against John. Sworn affidavits by some of the officers in that case and their testimony in court prove perjury by these officers. If these officers are prosecuted the trials of dozens of the inmates involved in the Southern Ohio Correctional Facility riot in April 1993 would be jeopardized as these same officers were witnesses in many of the riot cases. The indictments for perjury recently filed against John Welton by Mr. Grimshaw involve a deposition and an interrogatory in a civil case filed by a New Jersey company by a Columbus attorney. These documents were never filed in Scioto County, were never made a part of the case, never appeared in court or in the clerk of courts office and the case was dropped by the New Jersey company after their attorney saw the true audit reports and other evidence we gave to him." "John Welton also frightened the powers that be when he filed a request for documents in the \$250,000 secret pay-off by Steve Sturgill and other members of the school board," Mike said.

The insurance company paid Shawnee State University \$443,000 in Feb. 1994 after SSU business manager David Creamer filed a claim that John Welton had taken this amount. After a report of the full audit was published by the *Shawnee Sentinel* in 1995, Mr. Creamer quit his job at SSU and went to Alaska. During a pre-trial hearing On Aug. 27, 1996 Judge Donald Cox told the insurance company attorney Tom Novak, "You must not only prove that the money is missing, but you must prove he (John Welton) took it." A request by Mr. Novak for more time to gather evidence was denied by Judge Cox after Mr. Welton indicated he was ready and anxious to go to trial. After the hearing the Shawnee State University Attorney and Mr. Tom Novak were seen together at the SSU campus. Mike Welton asks, "The papers were never filed by the Columbus attorney, were never made a part of the case; where did Prosecutor Lynn Grimshaw get the documents?" ♦ ♦ ♦

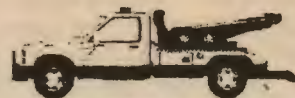

The list to the right of this column shows the names and salaries of the ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF and the ADMINISTRATIVE/TECHNICAL SUPPORT STAFF of Shawnee State University as of Mar. 18, 1996. This information was obtained from the SSU Library simply by asking for it at the Main Desk.

Many records, such as copies of the minutes of the SSU Board of Trustees meetings and the complete SSU Rules and Regulations are available at the Library and may be copied by anyone.

SSU is a public state agency and all records are public, with the exception of some personal student information. Section 149.43 of the Ohio Revised Code declares: "All public records shall be promptly prepared and made available to any person at all reasonable times during regular business hours."

Records of business transactions of all types, including bids and contracts on purchases or services, employment applications, personnel files, credit card purchases and long distance telephone records may all be viewed on request and copies may be obtained.

Requests should be made to the Business Affairs Office. It is advisable at SSU to make the request(s) in writing. No reason for making the request need be given. Copies of documents may be obtained for ten cents each. Copies of computer tapes and disks may also be obtained.

The records are open to everyone: students, faculty, administrators, all employees, and to the general public.

PUBLIC INFORMATION EASY TO FIND

Printed below is an example of information that may be found from public records. The records shown below were gathered as a result of violations against the *Sentinel*.

In April, 1996 certain administrators at Shawnee State University, headed by SSU Vice President of Student Affairs Dr. Larry Mangus and assisted by SSU Student Activities Director David Edwards, conspired unlawfully in the deprivation of rights, and privileges secured by the Constitution to the students and other members of the *Shawnee Sentinel* newspaper. Under color of authority, (invoking the name of a state agency (Shawnee State University) and using the name and title of the head of that agency (President Clive Veri), Dr. Mangus and Mr. Edwards caused telephone calls to be made to advertisers of the private *Shawnee Sentinel* newspaper in an attempt to damage the freedom of the press.

This conspiracy was directed against the citizen members of the *Shawnee Sentinel* in the exercise of federal rights and privileges with the intent to damage or prevent the exercise of these rights and privileges.

In preparation for action in federal court *Shawnee Sentinel* reporters began collecting documents, recordings and witnesses. Shown below are two of the many exhibits that *Shawnee Sentinel* reporters have secured. Although not necessarily relevant to the civil rights violations, they do have relevance in definition of character. Phone call records of SSU Student Service were obtained. One document shown below is a reduced copy of long distance phone calls made by Dr. Larry Mangus in March, 1996. Underlined is a call to CANTON, OH made 3/21/96 beginning at 12:24 p.m. The call was of 13 minutes and 43 seconds duration and cost the taxpayers \$4.37. The number called was 216-488-2652.

From a Canton, Ohio phone book found at the Portsmouth Public Library it was determined that this call was made to the residence of Donald F. Mangus at 3021 Fifteenth Street, SE.

Apparently this is a personal phone call made at public expense, during working hours, and could be construed as theft in office, in violation of Section 2921.41 [A] (2) of the Ohio Revised Code. This is the same section that SSU Bursar John Welton was convicted under, and sent to state prison.
