At its September 17 meeting, the Board of Trustees welcomed Latricia Sessor as its newest student member. Sessor, a junior majoring in social science, replaced Joyce Odle whose term expired on June 30.

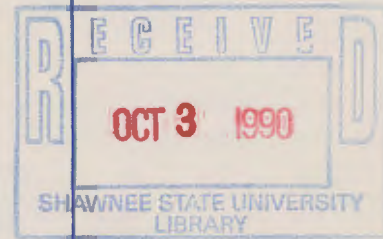
In other action, the Board:

1. Approved the hiring of Michael E. Day, coordinator for SOCF student affairs; Candace Chaboudy, senior instructor, CRADTAL; Carl O. Hilgarth, instructor, College of Engineering Technologies; Jessica J. Jahnke, director, CRADTAL; Mike Barzgari, instructor, College of Engineering Technologies; Ted Strickland, assistant professor, Division of Social Sciences; Kaddour Boukaabar, senior instructor, Division of Mathematics and Science; Cathy Mullins, coordinator of special programs, Office of Continuing Education; Robert Heatherly, science laboratory coordinator, Division of Mathematics and Science; and the promotion of Connie Salyers to associate director of public services, Library/Media Services.
2. Approved a moving expense payment policy. The purpose of the policy is to provide reasonable guidelines and channels for approving the payment of moving expenses.
3. Approved a request to the Kettering Foundation for a grant of \$93,860 to help build an Ecology Center at Shawnee State.
4. Accepted the resignations of Mike Gampp, associate director of University Information Services, and Mark Moore, programmer for University Information Services.

In reports from the vice presidents, Dr. A.L. Addington congratulated programs in the College of Health Sciences for their performance during the 1989-1990 academic year. "Unfortunately, it is sometimes very difficult to document in clear terms how successful academic programs are. However, in the College of Health Sciences, we have national and state tests that give us very clear indications of the quality of our programs."

Dr. Addington then called on Dr. Jim Kadel who reported that 100 percent of the associate degree of nursing and occupational therapist assistant program graduates passed their national exams. After recognizing the efforts of Joanne Abel, Cathy Perry, and Mendy Montavon, Dr. Kadel also said respiratory therapy missed the 100 percent mark by one student.

Dr. Paul Crabtree presented the student affairs report and said applications for 1990-1991 continue to be 18 percent over

last year and that surveys for graduates and registered students are being developed. He concluded his report with a presentation of the new Shawnee State recruitment video.

Neil Hawk, vice president of business affairs, presented a progress report on the Indoor Physical Education Center, the relocation of Second Street, and the University's plan to acquire property owned by the Campus Ministry. The Board also received a capital status report and a letter from Ray Moore, assistant vice president of business affairs, indicating the status of the University's cash reconciliation.

In reports from constituents, Dr. Jeff Bauer reported that the UFA is currently working on a faculty handbook and forming a committee to review the advantages and disadvantages associated with moving to a semester system. He also said the SEA has been working hard at developing language for its new contract and has settled all but two articles.

Board chairperson, Verna K. Riffe, asked that Bauer share with the SEA membership her concern regarding a headline in the *Portsmouth Daily Times* that said she was "miffed." Riffe said her comments in no way included the term and that the *Daily Times* is considering a correction. (Editor's note: A correction has since been printed.)

### Remember to Register

A reminder that November 6 is Election Day and some of you need to register in order to participate in this privilege and responsibility.

To register, you must be:

1. A U.S. citizen
2. At least 18 years of age by Election Day
3. A resident of Ohio (you must have lived in Scioto County for 30 days prior to the election)

The Scioto County Board of Elections is located in the Court House at Sixth and Court Streets in Portsmouth. Stop in their office and complete a form; they will inform you of your polling place.

You will need to update your registration if you have changed your name or address. Registration must be completed 30 days before the election, so act quickly.

### Library Acquires GPO on CD-ROM

The Library now has GPO on CD-ROM. This index to information on United States Government Publications contains bibliographic citations from 1976 to the present for books, reports, studies, serial titles, and maps. Topics covered include finance, business, demographics, agriculture, medicine, public health, and more. The index will give you a full record of title, author, class number, and publication year.

The GPO CD-ROM can be placed on the ERIC station across from the Reference/Information desk. Ask a librarian to exchange CD-ROM disks when you need to use the GPO index.

Several local events will take place, including a concert by Eduardus Halim, Indonesian-born classical pianist, in the Massie Auditorium on October 5 at 8:00 p.m. The performance is free and open to the public.

## Health Fair Slated

The Southern Ohio Council on Health Services, a cooperative between Shawnee State University and the Southern Ohio Medical Center, will host a fall quarter health fair on October 4 and 5. The fair will be held on the Shawnee State campus from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. on Thursday and from 8:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. on Friday.

The fair will include a two-mile health walk from campus to Alexandria Point Park and back and informational booths on cholesterol screening, blood sugar testing, women's health, nutrition, AIDS/communicable diseases, drugs/alcohol, fitness, pulmonary screening, and organ donation. The first 300 participants will receive a free bear care T-shirt.
