From The Board Room

The November meeting of the Board of Trustees of Shawnee State University was preceded by an Open House of the new addition to the Allied Health Building. The event marked the formal opening of the addition, which houses the Occupational Therapy Assistant Program and the Physical Therapist Assistant Program. About 100 people attended, along with the Board of Trustees members.

At their meeting, the Board passed five resolutions. The first named the firm of Baxter, Hodell, Donnelly, and Preston as architects for the new University Center, and the second commended the members of the University Center Architect Selection Committee. The third resolution approved the hiring of Mary C. Freeman as programmer for the U.I.S. Department. Mary replaces Barbara Vansickle, who resigned to take a position elsewhere. The fourth resolution formally accepted the C.W.A. contract negotiated between the University and its hourly employees.

The final resolution named Dr. Catherine Horr as Assistant President effective December 1. Cay will also serve as acting president in the absence of Dr. Ewigleben, whose resignation takes effect January 31, 1989. Effective February 1, 1989, Cay will serve as Interim President until a new president is named. The search for the new president is ongoing, with the national advertisement having appeared on November 16.

Followed by a holiday celebration at the Shawnee State Park Lodge, the December meeting of the Board of Trustees resulted in approval of a request to solicit bids for consulting services to assist in development of an administrative salary system. In addition, bylaws for the Board of Trustees and a plan for determining control of the Practical Nursing Program were adopted.

Fall Enrollment Report

Shawnee State University's fall '88 headcount enrollment is 2,968, approximately the same as last year's 2,972. Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) enrollment is 2,372 or up 13 from last year's record. This first year of baccalaureate programming finds us with 463 students pursuing the four-year degree, 1,992 pursuing a one-year certificate or associate degree, 232 undecided, and 281 considered special or non-degree status.

Additionally, there are 1,888 freshmen, 632 sophomores, and 448 juniors. Of these, 2,735 are residents of Ohio, and 233 are residents of other states. Further, there are 910 part-time students and 2,058 full-time students. Program specific data, longitudinal analyses, trend analyses and projections, as well as detailed information of various types are available in the Fall Enrollment Report to be released soon by the Office of the Registrar.

Undeliverable Returned Mail Stacking Up

Over 35 pieces of returned mail have accumulated in University Mail Service. This mail cannot be returned to the university department that sent it because none of the envelopes bear the department's return address or budget number.

The university mail service policy issued August 15, 1988 (II.,C.,2.) requires a department return address and department budget number "on each piece of outgoing mail" Further, the policy states (III.,C.,2.,b.), "Returned mail without a return address shall not be opened by UMS to identify the sender"

Department heads are urged to review their department's mail handling procedures and ensure that each and every outgoing mail envelope bears a return address/budget number so that any undeliverable mail can be returned to the sending department. Departments have had ample time to implement the return address/budget number requirements since printing of the notice in the June 15th Shawnee Statement and distribution of the policy statement in August.

Effective immediately and in accordance with the policy (II.,C.,3.), "Outgoing mail which does not have the budget number will be returned to the department." (That is, of course, if the department can be otherwise identified.) Any department wishing to check through the accumulated collection of undelivered and unreturnable mail may do so in the central receiving area by appointment with Chris Hartstein (ext. 201).

Women in Science

The Office of Continuing Education hosted a Women in Science program on Friday, November 4. Women in Science is a program designed to increase awareness of career opportunities in science, math, and engineering among Ohio girls in grades seven through twelve. The program was funded by a \$500 grant from the Ohio Board of Regents through the Ohio Academy of Science, All of the presenters were women who are successful professionals in our area. The Shawnee State University Women in Science program hosted 253 girls in grades seven through nine from schools in Scioto, Lawrence, Pike, and Adams counties. Each girl selected two workshops from a listing of 12 workshop offerings: Biological Sciences (Julie Basham, SSU; Gayle Muenchow, OU); Chemistry (Jody Upham, Martin Marietta); Laboratory Technology (Sister Severin Duehre, Mercy Hospital); Mathematics (Virginia Hamilton, SSU); Mechanical Engineering (Sandy Fout, Martin Marietta); Nutrition and Dietetics (Teresa Johnson, Mercy Hospital); Medicine (Kathryn Skitarelic, U.S. Health of Southern Ohio); Pharmacy (Toy S. Biederman, U.S. Health of Southern Ohio); Physics and Nuclear Engineering (Bonnie Rumble, Martin Marietta); Veterinary Science (Gail Counts-Jock, Shawnee Animal Clinic; Vivian Barnes, Morehead State University).

Other schools which have Women in Science programs include: Lourdes College, Cuyahoga Community College, Notre Dame College, Wittenberg University, The Ohio State University, Ohio University, and College of Mount St. Joseph.
