Black Awareness Month Observed on Campus

February is Black Awareness Month, and, as you've noticed from the posters around campus, the University will host a number of activities throughout the month.

The first activity, "Beyond the Dream: A Celebration of Black History," was presented on February 1 live, via satellite through a large screen TV in Massie Theater. The telecast, originating from Washington, D.C., was the first of its kind and brought together distinguished experts who spoke on the contributions of Blacks to this country. The program featured prominent people in education, politics, business, the military, the arts, entertainment, and sports.

On February 10 a play, "Exerpts from the 60's: The Civil Rights Movement," was presented in the Activities Center. The production reflected the lives of Medgar Evers and Fannie Lou Hamer and highlighted the activities of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. The play was a presentation of Kelsey Productions of Washington, D.C.

This week, February 13-17, and Tuesday, February 21 the acclaimed film series "Eyes on the Prize" is being shown in the Student Union from 1:00-2:00 p.m. each day. Two major feature films will also be shown in the same location: "Cry Freedom" on Wednesday, February 22; and "The Color Purple" on Thursday, February 23. Both films will air at 1:00 p.m., and all of these films are free to the public.

Campus Visitation Day, an annual event, will take place Monday, February 20. Area minority junior high and high school students and their families will meet our faculty and administrators, explore several of our technologies, witness the "Paving the Way" program, and have the opportunity to meet the Hon. Shirley Chisholm at an evening meal.

The Honorable Shirley Chisholm, the first Black woman to seek the nation's highest office, will speak at 8:00 p.m. on February 20 in the Activities Center. Chisholm has earned praise for her efforts on behalf of Black colleges, compensatory education, minimum wage for domestics, American Indians, the Haitian refugees, migrant farmworkers, and the poor. By writing, teaching, lecturing, and traveling around the nation, Mrs. Chisholm hopes to create a new national state of mind that demands peace, prosperity, and equality for all Americans. Her talk, entitled "Knowledge is Power: The American People," is free and open to all. We urge you to attend.
