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Shawnee Statement

A Perspective

(Data acquired from the Ohio Board of Regents, January 1989)

Ohio is a wonderful state. It is an enriching place to live, work, study, and appreciate a surprisingly diversified quality of life. But in spite of forward strides, many challenges remain.

Did you know . . .

... that Ohioans have below average levels of education. Based on 1980 census information, Ohio ranked 30th with 67% of its population having at least 4 years of high school. Ohio ranked 40th in the number of college graduates with 13.7% as compared to the national average of 16.2%.

. . . that Ohio's manufacturing workers have less education than similar workers in other states.

... that one million Ohio workers are judged to need retraining.

... that relatively few Ohioans go on to college after graduation from high school; the education gap in our workforce, if not addressed, will consequently grow in the future. Recent improvements in state education and R & D funding are helping, but other states are moving aggressively too.

... that for a long period, Ohio has been in decline. Ohio's per capita personal income is slipping relative to the national average (from rank 14, equal to the national average in 1970, to rank 25, 5.6% below

the national average in 1987).

... that our share of U.S. manufacturing is falling steadily. According to the Census Bureau, as a percent of U.S. totals, Ohio's share of employees in manufacturing declined from 7.2% in 1967 to 6.0% in 1981. The share of value added and value of shipments has also been declining. In addition, based on the Hudson Institute Workforce 2000 Report, U.S. manufacturing as a whole will be a much smaller share of the U.S. economy with service industries gaining importance.

... that our unemployment rate, relative to U.S. averages, has been

rising during each economic cycle.

... that Ohio is still well below the national average in corporate research and development and in university sponsored research. Consequently, industries that will spring up around new technologies are unlikely to emerge in Ohio.

In 1984, Ohio ranked 37th among the states' Federal research grants per capita to colleges and universities. Ohio's per capita share was

42% below the national average.

In addition, Cleveland Tomorrow has reported that from 1970 to 1985, U.S. industry had a 68% increase in R & D spending. Although the Great Lakes states reflected a 30% increase, Ohio showed virtually no change.

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Education is to be aware of the uniqueness of each individual and to treat that uniqueness with loving concern. To provide each student with the opportunities appropriate to his or her abilities and interests. To encourage each to develop an 'I will, I can' attitude. To help kids go a step above and beyond what they, themselves, or others, might expect of them.

FAX for All

Paul Dawson and I are pleased to announce that our departments have collaborated on the installation of a FAX machine to facilitate university business. The machine is on-line and available now in the university switchboard operator's office in Massie Hall. The only restriction is that use be limited to official university business only. Very little training is necessary, but it is requested that first-time users contact either Rick Hatton or me before attempting to use the FAX machine.

Similar to a telephone call, a long-distance FAX transmission requires use of your access code. Please know the appropriate telephone access code and the receiving FAX number before you attempt to use the FAX machine. The university's FAX number is (614) 355-2416. Give this number to those who will need to access you through a FAX transmission. And, very importantly, since a large number of users potentially are involved, please ask the sender to include your name on the first page or on a cover sheet.

Should you receive a FAX transmission, you will be called by the telephone operator. You'll have the option of picking up the faxed information or requesting that it be delivered through campus inter-office mail.

The cost of FAX use will be allocated to the user department through the telephone accounting system in the same manner as other toll calls.

Interlibrary Loan Increases

As a means of supplementing our library collection, reference services offers a program known as interlibrary loan (ILL). ILL is offered to all Shawnee State community members: faculty, students, administrators, and support staff. What you may not be able to find in this library (book or periodical article) we can request for you from over 4,000 other libraries across the North American continent. Most of these libraries communicate requests via an on-line computer system we know as OCLC, based in Columbus, Ohio. ILL requests are delivered by the U.S. Postal Service, so requests generally arrive within 7-10 days.

Now that we have a baccalaureate degree curriculum and are promoting the service more to students (including our students at SOCF), we have seen our transaction requests increase significantly. Our ILL statistics show that in January 1988 we processed 52 requests; in January 1989 we processed 262 requests — a 504% increase over last year this time. Our year-to-date statistics increased also. July 1987 to January 1988 totals show 334 transactions processed, and July 1988 to January 1989 totals show 756 transactions processed, which is a 226% increase.
