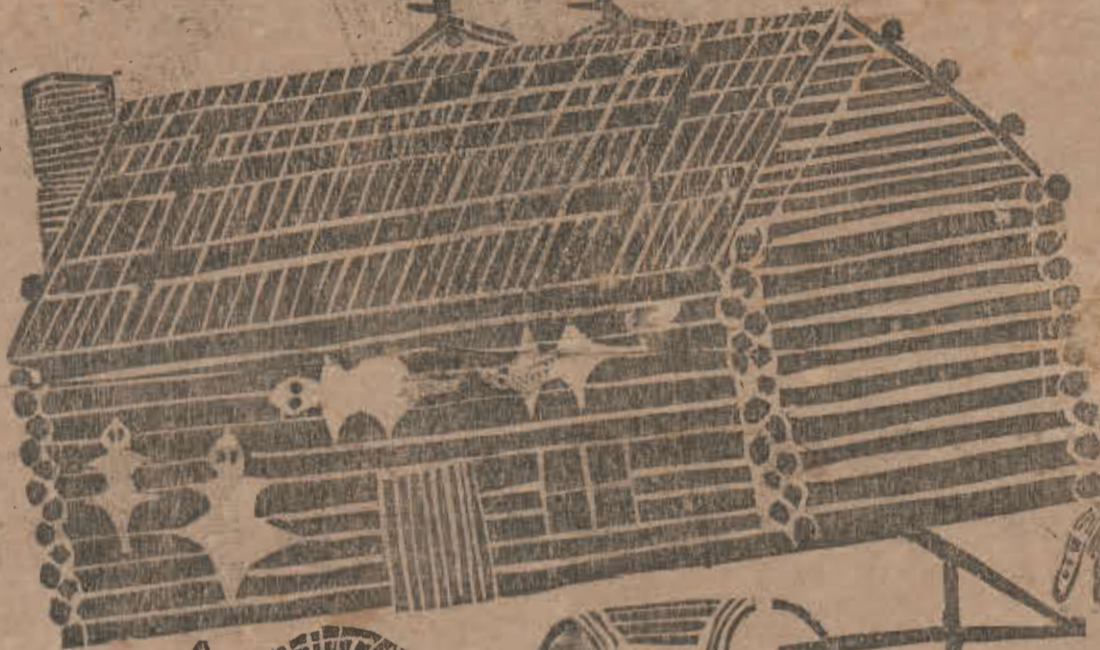

We have the sublime gratification this afternoon, (the north-west mail being just in) of announcing to the people of Ohio, and the whole Union, that Ohio is redeemed and disenthralled from the blighting grasp of suspended bank and shiplaster federalism. The democratic majority in the north-west, the last Senatorial and Representative district to be heard from when we issued our last slip, must be 3 or 400. This gives us two majority in each branch, and four majority on joint ballot! The returns are now complete from the whole State! We have not lost a member in a single Representative district which we carried last year. The Senators elected this year are under the new apportionment law of 1839-40, and this is the first vote for Senator in those districts electing this year, in all of which the federal vote is reduced from last year on Governor. By this new arrangement of districts, we have lost three Senators from last year, by very small majorities. We have reversed a federal majority in the House of 30, got 2 majority, & lost four by floating members from last year, from democratic to federal counties. This is equal to a change of 36 members. This, too, in a State which gave Gen. Harrison, less than a year ago, over 25,000! And from a hasty scanning of the popular vote, we feel warranted in stating that it is now on the democratic side.

Other States may boast as they please, but we know nothing that surpasses this in the revolution going on throughout the Union. Friends of sound principles rejoice—that the democracy of Ohio are still true to their principles and their country. Let the friends of the supremacy of the laws—or constitutional government—of a sound currency feel that this is a great and a glo-
