Physical Facilities Repairs, Repairs, and Applause: A Combined Report

On September 14, the Little Floor Company arrived at Shawnee State to make corrections to the new Activities Center floor. The work will take two days to complete and the floor cannot be used until September 19. We feel the correct portrayal of the Shawnee State image is certainly worth the wait.

Columbia Gas has decided that a section of six inch gas pipe from the old Front Street right of way (just west of the tennis courts), across the "Campus Green," to the Business Annex must be replaced.

The work is expected to be completed during fall quarter.

Now for the applause! A standing ovation should be given to maintenance employees, John Sparks and Paul Winn for saving the University anywhere from \$3,500 to \$5,100 in repair costs and an unknown amount of time by diagnosing and repairing a fault in logic boards that control the supply fans in Massie Hall.

The fault, which was identified as being in the electronic variable speed drive controllers in the motors, had shut the fans down. The boards, which were replaced once before at a cost of \$3,200, were quoted at up to more than \$5,000 this time. John and Paul removed the boards from the equipment, repaired the boards, and the fans are performing their function as if nothing happened.

It should be noted that John and Paul did not hesitate to use their current skills to avoid a major cost to the University. Another reason to advance the notion of increased funds for skills development.

Personnel Notes

Shawnee State seems to be going through a period of "family development" lately, so now is a good time to review the procedure involved with adding a newborn to your health care plan. Although you have thirty days in which to add your baby to your plan, it is vital you attend to this detail as quickly as possible; the time goes by rapidly and they must be formally added in order to have coverage. It is a simple procedure.

Community Mutual: If you carry Community Mutual coverage, family plan, pick up an enrollment form from the Personnel Office and complete it, marking that you wish to "add dependent(s)." List the new dependent's name and date of birth in the bottom section before signing it. Return it to the Personnel Office where we will submit it for you. Coverage is guaranteed for thirty-one days and the

effective date is the date of birth.

Should you adopt a child, you should also complete and sign an enrollment form. If this is done within thirty-one days of the adoption, the child will be covered from the date of adoption. Date of adoption is defined as the date the child establishes residence with the insured or the date the petition for adoption is filed, whichever event occurred last.

Community Health Plan: Community Health Plan insureds also need to pick up an enrollment application in the Personnel Office. Complete it, checking the box marked "Adding a Dependent," and sign and date it. You must, additionally, select a primary care provider and list his/her name on the enrollment form before giving it to Personnel for submission to the company. Coverage is guaranteed for the new baby provided this form is submitted within thirty days of his/her birth and is effective on the date of birth.

Since there is a lot of activity surrounding the newborn's debut into society, we strongly suggest that you stop in the Personnel Office well in advance of the predicted birthdate to complete and sign the appropriate enrollment form, leaving the baby's name and date of birth blank. If you will then ask someone to call the Personnel Office after the baby is born, we will be happy to fill in the blank for you.

Let's stop now a few minutes to welcome our newcomers to our midst. We encourage you to take a little time from your busy day to greet these fine people . . .
