# Shawnee Statement

## From the Board Room

At their September 24 meeting, the Board of Trustees authorized the submission of E G & G Inc., of Akron, Ohio, to the Ohio State Architect for negotiation of a contractual agreement for the relocation of Second Street. The Second Street project is expected to begin by the summer of 1990.

During reports from the Shawnee State vice presidents, the Board heard a report from Dr. A. L. Addington on the successful implementation of the integrated core curriculum.

"The integrated core is one way that Shawnee State differentiates itself from other state institutions of higher learning," said Addington. "The core places us well ahead of established sister institutions who are having difficulties in changing over to similar systems. Shawnee State has the same kind of advantage that an emerging nation has in that we can use the latest in technology in avoiding the mistakes of the past."

The Board also approved five other resolutions, including an authorization for President Clive Veri and his staff to investigate the purchase of city property for university outdoor sports facilities and maintenance space.

• To move the Shawnee State operating fund accounts to Bank One of Portsmouth as part of a cycle among local

banks

• A revision to Resolution 29-89 to offer two-year contracts to Mark Moore, programmer II, and Maryann Tomlin, MIS Resource Specialist. Both were originally offered one-year contracts.

• To ensure campus architectural cohesion and adherence to the Facilities Master Plan, Facility Planning Principles were

approved.

• The hiring of Dr. James M. Miller, Assistant Professor of Sociology, and Mary Lynd, Assistant Professor, Associate Degree Nursing. Miller's contract is retroactive to September 18, 1989. The Board also approved the resignation of Valerie Kramer, director of the Occupational Therapy Assistant Program, effective October 13.

#### Library/Media Services

The Shawnee State Library has two electronic reference stations that utilize state-of-the-art technology. One, INFOTRAC, which provides access to 1100 general interest and scholarly periodical publications, is being used regularly by our students. The second, ERIC on Silver Platter, is an index to literature in education and related disciplines.

INFOTRAC is designed to be user friendly, and students tend to either teach themselves or ask the reference librarians for instruc-

tions. It can normally be learned in less than five minutes.

ERIC requires significantly more instruction for efficient use. Connie Salyers and Gary Stottlemyer are offering training sessions for using ERIC. Training sessions were offered the first week of fall quarter, and the second set of sessions will be offered during the week of October 20. The schedule is as follows:

## Adopt a Planting Area

The Learning Center staff proposed to the President's Council that Shawnee State try a plan allowing employee groups to "Adopt a Planting Area." Those among us with green thumbs will have the chance to beautify our environment and have fun besides.

A "planting area" is a defined planting space on university property which is not fully occupied by shrubs and perennial plants. Examples would be the concrete squares around trees in the parking lot, the square openings around trees in front of the Commons Building, or any shrub bed with additional space in front for flowers or low-growing plants. To adopt a particular planting area for one year, an employee or group of employees applies by memo to the President's office with a copy to Jock Peters, Director of Physical Facilities. The memo identifies the person or members of the group. With approval from the President, that planting area is designated for the employee or group. Planting areas are adopted on a first come, first served basis, and you will be notified promptly by the President's office if your spot is available.

Those adopting a planting area agree to be responsible for:

• Planting it for the year as they see fit, with encouragement to plant for the growing seasons of spring, summer, and autumn.

• Caring for the plants, which may include trimming, cutting

flowers, or spraying for pests or diseases.

 Maintaining the bed, which includes weeding, routine clean-up of trash and debris, removing or replacing dead plants, and watering, if at all possible.

• Providing weather-proof labels, if desired. This can include identifying the caretakers of the area ("These plants are provided and maintained by the staff of the Learning Center") and/or the plants (e.g. plant names for an herbal or Appalachian plant area).

The University, through Physical Facilities, will be responsible for supplying mulch upon request, and the Maintenance Department will loan basic tools for a day. The contact person will meet with Jock Peters to obtain basic information before any group begins planting their area.

"Adopt a Planting Area" is an experimental project the University will try for the 1990 year and then review. Fall is the time to plant spring bulbs, so if you would like to participate, send your request soon. For further information, call Gene Beckett (x277) or Cay Horr (x283).

#### **Physical Facilities**

#### Construction Comments

Library construction remains on track after the successful testing of test pilings during the last week of September. The pilings, which are designed to withstand 28 tons of pressure, were checked for deflection (total movement downward) and then rebound (return movement upward) by applying and then disengaging 56 tons of total hydraulic pressure. Both deflection and rebound were found to be within the ASTM (American Standards of Testing Materials) guidelines.

Now, soil engineers will re-check the existing test data and determine how deep our pilings have to be. Following the go-ahead, a sequence of events will take place. First, the pilings will be poured and then capped. At that point, construction will move up and out

as columns and grade beams are poured.

#### **Building Access and Security**

In order to implement the university's Building Security Policy, the

following procedures have taken effect:

Buildings are opened at 7:00 a.m. (outside doors unlocked, alarms turned off) on weekdays, with the exception of university holidays. Buildings are secured (outside doors locked) at 11:00 p.m. on weekdays by guards and custodians.

Buildings are opened on Saturday when classes are scheduled. Massie Hall is open on Saturday for Library hours. Buildings are "officially closed" as soon as possible after the last class is dismissed or

when the Library closes, whichever is later.

On weekends and university holidays, buildings are accessible between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. to persons to whom an outside door key has been issued. The alarms will be turned off, but outside doors will remain locked. At any other time, building alarms may be activated and the buildings are not accessible.

Each weekend and holiday a sign-in/sign-out sheet is posted in each building near the preferred entrance. Please use the sheet to indicate your arrival and departure. It is important that security or service personnel be able to find you or account for you in case of an emergency (fire, building evacuation, etc.) in a building which is

"officially closed."

Copies of the Building Security Policy and the Key Control Policy have been distributed to department heads and administrators. If you have questions about these university policies, please ask for a copy from them. If there are still questions, call the Director of Physical Facilities, extension 310.

## Awareness Day Brings AIDS Realities to Shawnee State

A standing room only crowd packed into the Massie Hall auditorium on Wednesday, September 27 to hear the facts and impact of AIDS as part of AIDS Awareness Day at Shawnee State. The Fall Wellness Fair was presented by the Southern Ohio Council on Health Services, a cooperative effort of Shawnee State and U.S.

Health Corporation of Southern Ohio.

The Awareness Day began with more than 30 in attendance in the Board Room for three video productions. The program then moved to Massie Auditorium for three guest speakers. First, Mike, who contracted AIDS through a blood transfusion, discussed the impact of the disease on his life and his family. Kathryn Skitarelic, M.D., followed with an educational viewpoint focusing on the prevention of AIDS. The final program, a "Safer Sex Workshop" for students only, presented guidelines for the prevention of AIDS and STD's.

Paul Crabtree, chairperson for the Southern Ohio Council on Health Services, said the Fall Wellness Fair was very successful. "We are very pleased with the tremendous attendance at this event. The AIDS issue is such a formative one in our society today that there is a need for informative avenues to bring the facts to the public. Those who attended any part of the Awareness Day are more educated about the transmittal, prevention, and effects of the AIDS virus."

#### Positive on Plastics

The Shawnee State plastics engineering technology program was highlighted in the September edition of *Plastics News*. The article focused on the continuing expansion of the plastics curriculum to offer a new four-year degree program in plastics engineering technology.

Lyle Smith was quoted in the piece as saying that Shawnee State is one of the few universities offering a degree in plastics technology rather than polymer engineering or basic mechanical engineering. "We feel we will fill a void in the industry," said Smith. "Molders train people out of high school to run machines, but why should they take time to train employees? They can be more productive with trained employees."

More than 80 Shawnee State students in the plastics technology programs learn, among other things, hands-on machine operations, basic lab expertions, and machine maintenance.
