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

From the President



Dear Colleagues:

The Board of Trustees, at its October 16 meeting, approved a resolution that altered the Bylaws of the Board. While the changes can be described in a general sense as evolutionary, they have an important impact on the manner in which the Board exercises its responsibilities over Shawnee State University.

The first change is a restructuring of the Board committees and the tasks for which the committees will be responsible. All of the previous tasks carry over into the new committees, but others (in bold face) have been added.

Academic Affairs Committee

- · Academic policies and standards;
- · Approval of new degree programs;
- Review of existing academic programs;
- Awarding of degrees;
- · Review of promotion and reappointments of faculty; and
- Organization and staffing of Academic Affairs.

Quality of University Life Committee

- Intra-university communications and relationships;
- Student affairs, including admissions and enrollment, financial aid, inter-collegiate athletics, student life, and student services;
- Awards, honors, convocation, commencement, and other major university events;
- Personnel matters, including affirmative action, equal employment opportunity, and compliance with other state and federal laws:
- Promotion of alumni activities; and
- Organization and staffing of Student Affairs.

Finance and Facilities Committee

- Review and recommend the University's budgets, schedule of student fees, and financial operations, including annual audits, business organization and practices, borrowing of funds, investment of funds, and submission of and capital requests;
- Solicitation of funds;
- Approval of agency grants and contracts that exceed \$25,000 or that commit the University to continuing the grant activity beyond the grant period;
- Salary, wage, and benefit policies;
- Naming, location, planning, construction, and maintenance of the University's plant and grounds and the purchase and sale of lands and buildings; and
- Organization and staffing of Business Affairs.

- Executive Committee (includes the chairperson of the Board and the chairpersons of the three board committees)
 - Refer to a Board committee general university policies and business not specifically assigned to another committee;
 - Act on behalf of the Board on policy matters needing immediate attention and report such actions to the Board;
 - Orient and train new Board members;
 - Maintain relations with local, state, and federal legislative and administrative agencies;
 - Review bargaining unit agreements and make recommendations to the full Board;
 - Review grievances before they require adjudication beyond the University; and
 - Evaluate the performance of the President.

The three vice presidents will each serve as a staff resource person to the appropriate first three committees, while I will serve as the staff person to the Executive Committee.

My expectation is that the Chairman of the Board, Dr. Ray Carson, will be making committee appointments in the very near future.

The second change is the manner in which the Board conducts its meetings. In a desire to "give voice" to the significant constituent groups of the University, the Board's action will reserve a place on board meeting agenda for representatives of the U.F.A., U.A.A., S.E.A., C.W.A., and Student Government to address the Board.

I thank the Board, as I am sure everyone in our academic community does, for altering the Bylaws. As Chairman Carson said, "These changes will serve the University well and lead toward a spirit of collegiality we all seek."

A Potpourri of What's New

Building Update: Initial color selections have been made for the new Library/Media Building. Shades of taupe, deep blue, and maroon have been selected throughout, with the exception of the new Board Room which will be done in our new school colors — royal blue and dove gray.

Collection: The Technical Services Department, which is responsible for purchasing and processing all new materials added to the library collection, will soon move to the ground floor of the WIOI Building to provide space for increased numbers of new books arriving this year.

Departmental Liaisons: In an effort to increase communication between the Library and individual departments, a member of the professional staff has been assigned to each school/division. Liaisons will, as part of their charge, attend departmental meetings and cooperate, as possible, in collection development activities.

Fundraising: The library staff has prepared two proposals for consideration by possible donors during the Capital Campaign. One involves the direct purchase of equipment and software to establish an Electronic Reference Center, which would expand access to periodical indexes in CD-format in a broad range of topics. The second would allow for the purchase of equipment for users with special needs. An emphasis was placed on equipment for the visually impaired or blind and deaf students, with the purchase of a Kurzweil reading machine, magnification devices for computer displays and printed materials, machines which produce braille from print, and a telecommunications device for the deaf.

From the Learning Center New Beginnings

Fall quarter was the start of campus life for 25 young women in the New Beginnings program, sponsored by JTPA, Community Action Organization, and the Private Industry Council. These women, young mothers between 18 and 28 years old who did not complete high school, have enrolled in the one-year program in order to complete their high school education and begin taking credit-bearing courses at Shawnee State.

This quarter they are enrolled in a special ten-week GED course which includes a Life Skills class in which they are exploring the college catalog, learning about careers, completing grant applications, and preparing to register for winter quarter college classes. A special graduation ceremony, featuring Speaker of the House Vernal G. Riffe, Jr., is being planned to honor the students from the GED program and New Beginnings on December 8.

To our surprise, the New Beginnings class is planning their own "prom night." For many of the women, motherhood began at an early age, preventing them from attending their high school prom. For these women, completing their high school education includes planning prom night.

Developmental Reading Program Emphasizes Reading in the Disciplines

Because the developmental reading staff wants all students to be academically successful, they are emphasizing vocabulary development and increased comprehension in reading in the various disciplines. This emphasis has led instructors to require Reading 098 and 100 students to practice various reading strategies in their reading classes through the use of their own content area textbooks. In my own Reading 098 class, for example, students have used their biology, psychology, and economics textbooks for learning to use the SQ3R study plan, for identifying text structure, patterns of organization, and modes of writing/thinking, and for finding main ideas and their support. They are also learning how to annotate, outline, and map content area material.

As the new coordinator of the program, I am excited about this approach, but I also need help from faculty and division chair-persons. I would like to house a collection of content area textbooks in the Learning Center for use by individual students and for whole reading classes. Students would use the textbooks for reading strategy practice. If you would contribute old editions of textbooks

Inauguration Update

The forums will also provide a user group for the sharing of information and skills on the VAX system.

A Report on Your Hurricane Hugo Contributions

We collected money and with it purchased groceries (cases of Spam, green beans, corn, tomato soup, pancake mix, corn flakes, pinto beans, 50 lbs. of sugar, 50 lbs. of flour, and 100 lbs. of potatoes—all in small containers). The Portsmouth contributions were taken to a distribution center in Pawley's Island, South Carolina.

When it became evident, after 100 mattresses were donated, that this truck would be inadequate, OSCO promptly donated two semi's, complete with drivers.
