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

lucky; I have had instructors who been I have were self-confident and high enough in self-security to practice freedom of thought and self-expression. But for now, let's mention the type of teacher who doesn't risk expulsion from the of their peers. And, at the same time, let forget that teachers don't just fall into tinct categories, but may occupy a spot e along the spectrum between the two us not distinct somewhere along the spectrum between points.

One of my former instructors once accused me of being anti-intellectual. He said i refused to become a scholar. His final advice to me at the end of the quarter was to get into the intellectual groove and become a scholar. I should learn to think in a disciplined fashion, he said, and to accept the views of those worthy masters and doctors who have excelled and been accepted in the intellectual world.

think back over the quarter, I recall the names of those worthy masters whom he had accepted Ghandi, Martin Luther King, and many more who are less known to us. Even here I see a pattern -- all these men were of the same philosophy. For Them, the answer to everything was: Revolution. They were anti-capitalist, anti-free enterprise and they believed in the great paradoxical mystery of anarchy/totalitarian dictatorship.

Most instructors are die-hard believers in what they call the scientific method, or the empirical they call the scientific method, or the empirical procedure. This doctrine states that nothing can be accepted as truth unless it can be observed. The old timers made great use of the system of trial and error over many generations. They had truths they could fully depend on which couldn't be observed or understood; they just worked because they had been proven over and over to work. Not only this system, but many others, are wonderful tools of the truth-seeker.

But any system outside the accepted circle isn't considered by the intellectual scientific minds, because they are locked in their own shells and they don't want to be bothered with truth if it upsets their tater-wagon.

Professors always cry "academic freedom" as a

upsets their tater-wagon.

Professors always cry "academic freedom" as a defense for teaching communism and atheism, but when someone attempts to teach 1776 Americanism and Christianity, they are accused of all sorts of horrible things: They are unenlightened, anti-intellectual, unscholarly, and of course they are in violation of the constitution for not adhering to the policy of separation of church and state -- "They even tried to teach creationism!"

The intellectuals fail to mention that the

intellectuals fail to mention

religious belief in some government reports. also fail to mention that the theory of evolution is not scientific thought; no true scientist would accept a theory with so little proof. Instead, evolution is religious doctrine. It is scientism because it refutes blind faith to believe it. Christianity, on the other hand, doesn't require blind faith — there are three witnesses for every truth.

I hope your teachers fall into the group which defends "truth" and "freedom of thought" outside the accepted circles. If you have some of the other kind, then have patience with them.





First off, this has got to be the first time since the late-late Willie Shakespeare's day that anyone has used a phrase like "nay and forsooth;" "perchance to peruse."





The life of Thomas Jefferson

•IN PURSUIT OF REASON, THE LIFE OF THOMAS JEFFERSON by Noble E. Cunningham, Jr. Louisiana State University Press, 1987, hardback, 414 pages.

It was my intention, upon completion of reading In Pursuit of Reason: The Life Of Thomas Jefferson, to write a formal book review,

The purpose of a book review is to entice the reader to select the book because it is a worthwhile book or to discourage the reader because the book is a waste of paper. In Pursuit Of Reason

is not a waste of time. It is a magnificently detailed account of Jefferson's life, and for whatever reason you might choose this book, whether you are an admirer of Jefferson; a history student or teacher; a patriot or just an avid reader, I doubt you will be disappointed.

Keep in mind that this book was written by a history professor and is not an "easy" book. This is not a book for skimming, for in skimming details are missed and this book is full of details.

Rather than the dry, formal critique normally associated with reviews, what follows are a few interesting facts about Jefferson that you may or may not know, or maybe have forgotten. If these facts interest you, then i urge you to read In Pursuit of Reason.

Jetferson was the principal author of the Declaration of Independence. He was an early proponent of free, general education. From 1779-1781, Jefferson was governor of Virginia.

Jefferson proposed the decimal system of coinage. From 1784-1789 he lived in France. His duties included negotiating treaties of commerce. In 1785 he was appointed minister to France.

Upon his return to the U.S. from France, Jefferson found he had been named secretary of state under President Washington.

Jefferson had a major role in the formation of the Republican party. In 1801, he published a manual of parliamentary practice which is still the fundamental guide to senate practices today.

Jefferson was more active in his campaign for the presidency than any previous candidate. From 1801-1809 Jefferson was president of the United States.

In 1804 Jefferson sent the Lewis & Clark expedition to explore the newly acquired Louisiana purchase.

Aaron Burr, who was Jefferson's vice-president during his first term, was indicted for treason during Jefferson's second term (Burr was not vice president when indicted).

Finally, Jefferson is considered the founder of The University of Virginia.
