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

Since 1815, the City of Portsmouth has stood on the banks of the Ohio as a tribute to the strong-willed and diligent people who settled this beautiful land of rolling hills and flowing rivers. Now, it's time to honor that heritage and Shawnee State's role in the history and future of our great city.

And the easiest and most enjoyable way is to join either the "Brothers of the Brush" or the "Celebration Belles." Miami Collection and Approval Plan

Selection of the Miami Collection has been completed. More than 45,000 books have been examined and directed to either Goodwill or cataloging. Thanks to the faculty, staff, and student employees whose hard work allowed this massive project to be completed so

rapidly.

Such effort is now needed for the Approval Plan. Since early January of this year, Coutts Library Services, Inc. has been sending us bi-weekly shipments of books for our perusal. This week the shipment will include 27 boxes and cover a wide variety of subjects. In addition, we receive forms describing books. If you would like to see the book itself, we send Coutts the cards and they send the book. All books are sent on approval—i.e., we don't own them until we tell Coutts that we intend to keep them. We have \$4,000 to spend this calendar year and have only spent 8.48 percent of that amount.

The books are on display at the Library Annex (the WIOI building) for two-week periods. At this point, selectors are determined by the deans/chairs of the various departments. Books are replaced on alternated Friday afternoons, during which the Library Annex is

closed for two or three hours.

The profile is determined by the information we sent Coutts last fall quarter, the books we pick (and return), comments I give during our weekly phone calls, and specific requests from faculty. If you feel that certain desired subjects are not represented, please contact your Library liaison. The profile can be altered at a week's notice.

Professional Activities in the Community and Beyond

• Carolyn Gross attended a training institute on the new Welfare Reform Legislation on April 24 and 25 in Columbus. She also attended a two-day Ohio Adult and Continuing Education spring meeting in Columbus in April.

• Julia Coll worked on the conference committee for the 19th Annual International Bilingual/Bicultural Education Conference in Tucson, Arizona, April 21-24. More than 4500 participants took part

in the conference.

• Hagop Pambookian acted as a resource person on the Soviet Union for three sixth grade classes at the Minford Middle School on April 19. Hagop showed a slide presentation and answered the students' questions on life and culture, and children and schooling in the U.S.S.R.
