From the President

Dear Colleagues,

Each one of you stand on the threshold of having a positive and important impact on our Shawnee State University and its future.

"Wow, that's heavy, huh! What are you taking about?" I'm talking about your accepting one of the most important documents in Shawnee's young history—the Constitution and Bylaws of the proposed University Senate.

The ad hoc Governance Committee of the University Faculty Assembly has taken a giant leap of faith and proposed a new representative form of governance for Shawnee that includes faculty, staff, students, and administrators. It is a governance structure that proposes collegiality—a structure that holds great promise of forging a new partnership between the constituent groups that make up the Shawnee family.

"But, there are flaws in the Constitution and Bylaws!"

Yes, and even the Constitution of the United States has flaws. No constitution is perfect. They are meant to be "fixed" if they are "broken." And, there is a mechanism in place in the Shawnee document to not only do the fixing, but also chuck out the document in whole or in part after a three-year trial period.

The faculty's vote was tallied shortly after November 12th (but before presstime of this "Shawnee Statement"). If it is passed by the UFA, the document charges me with seeking the endorsement of the University Administrative Senate, the Communications Workers of America, and the Student Senate.

It has my strong endorsement. I now ask for yours.

Internet is an electronic computer network that is used extensively in higher education to communicate with colleagues throughout the world. It allows colleagues in higher education to transmit and receive important information regarding educational concerns.

Before the inception of Internet, communications between Shawnee State and sister college Nizhny Novgorod were handled through FAX transmissions which proved to be untimely due to logistical problems. The main problem was that Nizhny Novgorod's only access to a FAX was at a local post office which meant that transmitted messages could not be received instantly.

Electronic mail has opened a new line of communication that is relatively cost-free, fast, and easy to use. Internet is available on most university campuses and the service has recently been made available to faculty, staff, and administrators at Shawnee State.

The electronic mail received from Russia helped Hagop Pambookian in making final arrangements for a visit and lecture by Rector Alexander Khokhlov and Vice Rector Strongin during Shawnee State University's International Week last week.

The visit by our Russian friends followed an exchange visit by Hagop and Clive to Russia to finalize the sister university agreement. The International Awareness Week's activities highlighted that relationship. The next milestone will be the exchange visit by three students and one professor from each institution.

Library News

Naming the Library Catalog

The new Shawnee State Library catalog which we will be implementing this year will be called BEARTRACK. The name was suggested by Tim Thoroughman (great job, Tim) and selected by a committee of staff, faculty, and students from over 30 possible names that were suggested by the university community. The name and a logo (which is under development) will be used on all promotional and instructional materials this academic year as BEARTRACK is implemented and made available.

Access to Resources on Internet

Now that many of you are getting Internet accounts on Speedy, you may have an interest in checking the resources of other university libraries in Ohio from your desks or home computers. We have recently been given the logon information for four Ohio university libraries.

To gain access you must have an account on Speedy which can be obtained from UIS. After you have done so, contact Tess Midkiff. She will be happy to provide Telnet instructions to anyone upon request either in paper form or via campus e-mail.

In upcoming months, you will be able to access references to the combined resources of several university libraries in Ohio plus some indexes for general periodicals, newspapers, business periodicals, and dissertations. More later on that.

Ultimately this will mean that you will be able to check the holdings in our library when BEARTRACK implementation is completed.
