From the President


Dear Colleagues:

A couple of years ago, while cosponsoring a Disabilities Awareness Workshop, several of us at Shawnee were disabled temporarily in order to understand the problems that physically challenged people experience while trying to move around campus. Whether immobilized in wheel-chairs, or using crutches, or visually impaired, those of us who participated in the experiment developed a new-found empathy for people who face physical challenges each day!

We have an ADA Subcommittee that is working toward helping the university community understand the Americans with Disabilities Act and its impact on each of us as we carry out our services to students, staff, and guests of Shawnee State University.

During the end of this month, the ADA Subcommittee will provide campus-wide education for all faculty and employees about the ADA and its implications for educational institutions. Bear Care Health Fair Focuses on Disability Awareness

Shawnee State University's annual Bear Care Health Fair will be held Wednesday, October 25, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the University Center. The theme of the fair is "Disability Awareness," and this year's fair promises to be both educational and fun.

Dr. Violet Easch, of Marshall University, will speak about the application of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) in our university environment. The first step toward complying with the regulations of the ADA is to become aware of and to develop empathy for those with differing abilities which are not always easy to see with the casual eye.

Activities throughout the day include simulated experiences which raise awareness about abilities and disabilities (and yes, they will be fun!). Other activities include a 3.2 K (2-mile) walk, obstacle course, and food. Information booths from campus and local agencies will provide FREE health screening and information.

The Bear Care Health Fair is sponsored by the Southern Ohio Health Council, which includes representatives from Shawnee State University and Southern Ohio Medical Center.
