Mr. Hawk recommended that the minutes of the March 18, 1985 meeting be amended. Paragraph 5, line 4, page 2, the word <u>arbitrator</u> should be changed to <u>consultant</u>. The minutes of the special meeting held April 1, 1985 were approved.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Mr. Taylor invited Board members to attend the groundbreaking ceremonies on Thursday, April 18, 1985 at 2 P.M. for the new Student Center. He encouraged all members that could to attend.

Mr. Taylor asked Dave Gleason to give an updated report on the feasibility study committee's progress. Mr. Gleason gave each Board member a copy of a prepared report and he spoke to this report. (Report attached to these minutes).

There are some concerns and decisions that will have to be resolved in the near future, and the committee is working on these. The time table for completion of the report has changed, the report must be completed no later than the June Board meeting date and the committee is striving for completion (at least in rough draft form) by the May Board meeting date. This needs to be completed so that funding can be sought through the State Legislature to complete the study for the four year institution.

Mr. Gleason reported to the Board that the Ohio University Survey, conducted by Ohio University at their Branch campuses was delivered to him this date and that it was very positive and supportive of a four year institution at Shawnee State. Mr. Gleason presented to the Board a budget for the completion of Phase I of the feasibility. He indicated that there was a need for an additional \$10,000. Mr. Gleason explained that there is still much to be done. Re-writing will be done by members of the English department. Printing may have to be contracted off campus, and other consultants will be hired to review the report once it is in rough draft form.

Mr. Jenkins moved that \$10,000 be appropriated from Reserve Funds to complete Phase I of the Feasibility Study. Dr. White seconded the motion.

Whereas, each course presented in the one-year certificate program is on the current Ohio Board of Regents Course Inventory and is offered throughout the academic year.





FEASIBILITY STUDY INITIAL REPORT

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
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The following preliminary charts show some of the early results of the needs analysis portion of our final report. Of the seven major questionnaires listed below, the first five are represented by graphs in this initial report.

- Shawnee State Community College Student Survey
- Shawnee State Community College Former Student Survey
- Shawnee State Community College Graduate Student Survey
- 4. High School Counselor Survey
- 5. Educational Leaders Survey
- 6. High School Student Survey
- 7. Business and Industry Survey

It must be noted that the graphs on the following pages are only representative and are not conclusive at this time. However, we do feel that the Board of Trustees should be aware of some of the early findings.

Included in this report are copies of all seven surveys.



During the fall of 1984, students enrolled at Shawnee State Community College were surveyed. Of the 1242 students responding, 1180 (95%) indicated that Shawnee State should become a 4-year bachelor's degree granting institution, while maintaining the 2-year associate's degree programs. Sixty-two (5%) of the students surveyed disagreed.

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SHAWNEE STATE STUDENT SURVEY

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

> A sample of students who attended Shawnee State Community College but did not graduate were surveyed and 56 responded to the survey. Of those responding, 49 had an opinion on this question. Ninety two percent (45) indicated that Shawnee State Community College should become a four-year bachelor's degree granting institution, while maintaining the two-year associate's degree programs. Eight percent (4) of the former students disagreed.

> > SHAWNEE STATE FORMER STUDENT SURVEY




A sample of graduates of Shawnee State Community College were surveyed and 80 responded to the survey. Of those responding, 76 had an opinion on this question. Seventy three (96%) indicated that Shawnee State Community College should become a four-year bachelor's degree granting institution, while main-taining the two-year associate's degree programs. Three (4%) of the graduate students disagreed.

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SHAWNEE STATE GRADUATE SURVEY




Of the 56 respondents, 37 had an opinion on this question. Eighty four percent (31) responded "yes" and 16% (6) responded "no". It is significant that 19 counselors or 34% are undecided.

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One hundred eighteen educational leaders responded to the question. Of those who had an opinion within the Shawnee State Community College service area, 39 (95%) answered "yes" and 2 (5%) "no". Outside the service area, 30 (67%) answered "yes" and 15 (33%) "no".
